#### **General fund**

Income of £63,338 is c£5,800 less than budget. We are slipping further behind the

budget each month – March £400, April £700, May £2,900, June £4,500 and now £5,800. The general fund income to 31 July is £1,800 less than last year. We have seen generous responses to special collections; we also need to see an increase in our regular income.

Expenditure of £15,818 is ca. £2,800 less than budget.

### **Church funds**

Remittances of £40,000 are £3,000 less than budget and £6,000 less than last year.

The balance on the general fund at 31 July was a deficit of £2,557.

We need more income! The shortfall in income results in a shortfall in our remittances to church funds.

### **Honour killing in Azerbaijan**

Nazakat's husband was the first believer in his town. Nazakat became a Christian later on along with several others in the community. She did her best to grow in her faith and bring up her two small children to love Jesus. This was sometimes hard since her husband was often working out of town for months on end.

Eventually the strain on Nazakat began to show and she had a one-night-stand with another man. When her husband's family found out, they were furious at the shame she had brought on their family. Nazakat felt scared and nervous so her pastor offered to take her to the capital for her own safety. The morning before she was due to leave, her husband's cousin came to Nazakat's house and murdered her with a knife.

Please pray for Nazakat's husband and two children as they struggle to come to terms with what has happened. Please remember the small fellowship there too - pray for wisdom,

strength and protection.

## WONDERFULLY MADE

### Sharks

Sharks are voracious fishes, most of them meat-eaters. Unlike whales, they are not mammals and they do not suckle their young. They are noted for being greedy eaters and killers of sea-animals and generally live in the warmer parts of the oceans, although they may be found in colder waters as well. They breathe through gills, with from five to seven openings on either side of the head, and do not need to rise to the surface to breathe like whales.

Their skin is covered with scales which are rough to the touch when the skin is rubbed forwards. This is because the skin is covered by very small, thickly-set, skin-teeth. The skin, called shagreen, was formerly used by cabinet-makers instead of sandpaper for smoothing wood.

The mouth is on the underside of the head and the teeth are very sharp, generally triangular in shape and set out in parallel rows. The row of teeth on the ridge of the jaw is used, but as this is worn away it is replaced by the next row moving in to take its place.

The tail is vertical, not horizontal like the whale's: the upper part is longer than the lower and is usually notched. Most sharks can swim rapidly and will follow ships for days, hoping to get the food that is thrown overboard.

Some sharks lay eggs which are protected by a horny shell. Each egg is enclosed in what is known as a 'mermaid's purse'. Most sharks bear live young - three to six or more in a brood. Sometimes the young are quite large in comparison to their parents.

There are quite a number of varieties of shark.

The Whale Shark is the largest, but is also harmless. Found in southern oceans it is sometimes more than 50 feet long, but feeds only on small sea animals and plants. It is the largest known fish.

The next in size is the Basking Shark - up to 36 feet long. It also is harmless to humans. It likes to come to the surface and bask in the sun. Found mainly in the Arctic, it is sometimes found in the waters around the Western Isles of Scotland. It is said that it can filter 1,482,000 litres of water per hour to gather its food!

The Man-Eating Shark, also about 36 feet long, is found in all tropical and temperate seas.

The White Shark, found in tropical seas and also in the warm waters around the southern coast of the United States, is about 15 - 20 feet long and will also attack human beings.

The Blue Shark, called so because of its colour, is smaller - between 12 and 15 feet long, and also preys on humans. The Greenland Shark is also voracious and about the same length.

The Hammerhead Shark has an elongated snout at right angles to its body with an eye in each lobe at either end of the snout.

Tiger Sharks are also found in the Caribbean area and, off the Leeward Islands, feed on young albatross as they learn to fly.

There are other kinds of sharks such as the Dusky, Porbeagle, Bullhead, Dog and Leopard.

Some smaller fish, such as the dogfish, belong to the same class as the larger sharks.

Many sharks prey on fish that are useful for human food.

They may do serious damage to fishing-nets.

However, in Chinese restaurants you may find on the menu a soup called shark's fin soup. It is considered a great delicacy and is usually very expensive. It is made from the shark's fin. Steaks are made from the meat on the flanks and the large liver provides thousands of units of vitamins. The teeth are made into ornaments, the skin into leather, the bones into glue, and the rest into fertiliser.

Many sharks are ferocious hunters with extraordinary strength and dangerous to human beings, especially when hungry. Their strength and speed is outstanding.
