Minister's Update

Perspective is a strange thing. In the summer holidays, I was doing some climbing (as is my wont). I say summer holidays, although we haven't had much of a summer – at least down here. But up in the north and west they've had a great summer, and that's where I was climbing. I climbed Ben Hope, near the north coast of Sutherland. It's a mountain with an encouraging name, although the only derivation of the name I have come across is from an old Norse word meaning "bay" or "inlet". It is set between two large sea lochs – Loch Eriboll and the Kyle of Tongue – but "Hill of the Bay" still seems an unlikely name for such an impressive mountain.

I had climbed Hope before on several occasions, but always by the recognised path. Ben Hope is a Munro and therefore the "tourist path" is rather busy in summer. So this time I wanted to climb the much steeper north face (not as difficult as the north face of the Eiger, but difficult enough!

I climbed up from Loch Hope and once you're up over the lower slopes, you are confronted with what looks like

a sheer set of cliffs and gullies. I'd only seen it referred to in climbing books as a way down, not a way up, and I could see why. Maybe a very quick way down! That was the first perspective.

It's a bit like life. Some things rear up as daunting prospects. It may be the prospect of leaving home and coming to the city as a student or to work. How will I manage on my own? It may be the prospect of parenthood. How will I cope with the new responsibilities? It may be considering Christian faith and commitment or membership of the Church or witnessing as a Christian. How can I possibly do that? A daunting prospect.

But then I had a look with the binoculars. And lo and behold, what appeared unclimbably vertical turned out to be entirely possible. There was one gully that seemed to slope back comfortably into the mountain and reached right to the summit. I made up my mind that was the route for me. That was the second perspective.

We need that second perspective on the challenges of life too. It may be that sitting down calmly and looking more

closely at the issues will help. It may be that discussing it with a good friend will bring a new perspective. The best new perspective of all, the best “binoculars”, is looking at the problem through the lens of the Bible, God’s word. This does indeed bring a new perspective. It gives us God’s own perspective, not merely human opinion or tradition. If Jesus says, “Come to me all you who labour and are burdened and I will give you rest”, we can depend utterly on that. If he says, “Don’t be afraid, I will be with you. I’ll never leave you nor forsake you”, then we can face the future with confidence.

But there is a third perspective – the perspective of actually tackling the mountain! I could have gone home after the new perspective of the binoculars and told people, “The north face of Ben Hope is climbable!” But who would believe me when they learned I hadn’t actually climbed it? Climbing brought a different perspective again. It was tough. I had to climb large sections using hands as well as feet. And when I got to the top of the ridge I found I wasn’t at the summit. A wall of rock barred

the way. I had to climb around it. But it was one of the most exciting days climbing I have had. I even surprised some hinds and their calves in a corrie near the top.

So with life. Actually tackling the daunting prospect gives another perspective again. Both previous perspectives contribute to it. Aspects are as scary as the first glance revealed, but it is doable, as the second perspective showed. However, it is only as you follow the route revealed by the second perspective that you prove it.

There is of course a fourth perspective. The perspective from the top. You can look back and say, “I’ve done it! By the grace of God, I’ve done it!” There are times in life like that too, when you have tackled the seemingly insurmountable and you’ve overcome it. For the Christian there will be a final victory. As Paul said, “Forgetting what is behind and straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 3:13,14). This will give a final perspective. Then we will see

that God has worked all things together for good for those who love him (Romans 8:28).

Fundraising Gig!

Fundraising Gig - Change of Date

Due to a clash with the Women's Day Away, it has been decided to rearrange the fundraising gig for Saturday 4th October.

As mentioned in the last newsletter, the main purpose of the gig is to raise money for the Kirkcaldy community outreach building project. Kirkcaldy Free Church is situated in one of the poorest and most needy areas in Scotland, and already their building provides facilities for Fife Council, Health Workers, addiction services and their own Community Worker. Their vision is to see the local

community of Sinclairtown transformed by the gospel. The extension will comprise a new kitchen and a café. The old kitchen will become a meeting room. The work will cost £65,000. They have already raised £20,000. They hope to borrow £25,000 from the Free Church Board of Trustees. That leaves £20,000 to be raised and they are appealing to the wider church to help them with this.

Alex, with the help of Doug and Rob and others, has recorded a CD of some of his songs (the CD should be out shortly) and these songs will be given a new band sound by Alex and the boys on Saturday the 4th October. Neil MacMillan from Kirkcaldy will also speak about the project on the night.

General fund

Income of £61,257 is £2,360 more than the budget and £3,070 more than at the same date last year. Expenditure for the year to date is £500 less than budget, and £1,600 more than at the same point last year.

Deacons' Court

At the recent meeting of the Deacons' Court on 19th August, amongst other things the following was discussed:

Finance – progress in paying for the kitchen [see below], our ability to make payments to the central funds of the Free Church [impacted by some large bills recently], and the possibility of installing electricity meters that would allow us to track electricity usage more accurately [a good idea].

Insurance – whether people on church business have indemnity cover [they have] and whether communion cups and plates are covered during

storage [they are].

Maintenance – Loft insulation required for the manse [optimally this would entail convergence of a pensioner, a Wednesday (when B&Q have reductions for pensioners), Alex, a couple of fit non-pensioners (in addition to Alex, who is also a fit non-pensioner) and a car with a big boot].

Health & Safety – What direction should the legally required fire escape signs above the doors point [out the way], and what to do in the event of the fire alarm going off during a service [in event of fire evacuate the building through the available emergency exits and gather at meeting point outside front of church; once fire has been dealt with or it has been ascertained that there is no fire, fire alarm may be switched off from marked control in gallery]. Health and safety policy will be prominently displayed.

Diaconal work – the court will ask a number of folk in the congregation to act as points of contact with those who may be elderly, housebound, long term ill or who might otherwise appreciate support. The idea is

that regular contact will be maintained, as much for social interaction as anything else. If there are any specific needs identified (eg lifts to church, a helping hand clearing leaves, simple household repairs, etc.) the contact person would let a coordinating group set up by the Deacons' Court know so that appropriate action can be taken.

In fact, much of this is already taking place within the congregation, but there are gaps that need to be addressed. This is considered important, and will be a standing item on the agenda of the Deacons' Court. The court will not be asking for volunteers, but would ask that people be prepared to consider this if approached and asked to help.

Children's Safety

The crèche is on the vestry side of the church hall. The screens remain up until the church is vacated, so that children can be collected from the crèche / preschool safely. Juice is served to the children there. Due to Health and Safety children **MUST NOT** be at the kitchen side of the hall unsupervised. If children are in the church, then they need to be supervised at all

times, and should not attempt to climb the dangerous north face of the pulpit without appropriate safety gear.

Light

In Physics, light is considered as electromagnetic radiation which covers a broad spectrum of which visible light is a very small proportion. Some of the main elements of the spectrum are a) gamma rays b) X-rays c) ultraviolet radiation d) visible light e) infrared radiation f) various radio frequencies including UHF, VHF and microwaves.

In the stages of creation marked by the creation days, these different elements of the spectrum would most naturally come under the first day and their creation would be included in the statement, "And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light.

Each element has specific wavelengths which are used to describe particular regions of the spectrum. Specific frequencies, usually stated in vibrations per second or cycles per second, also characterise different regions of the spectrum.

Gamma Rays: These are an electromagnetic radiation of the same character as an X-ray, but with a much shorter

wavelength. X-rays were discovered in 1895 by Wilhelm K. Roentgen, but gamma rays were not discovered until some years later. They are given off by members of the uranium-radium series of radioactive elements when they disintegrate to form new elements. When a nucleus gives off a gamma ray, it loses a certain amount of energy. A very penetrating ray may lose a very large amount of energy and an iron sheet one inch thick would only block fifty per cent of such a ray. A heavy element such as lead would be more effective in absorbing its effect.

Very small amounts of gamma rays affect us from the natural environment – the water we drink and the air we breathe, and also from the furniture in the home. Only large amounts of gamma radiation are dangerous, but even they may be of great benefit when they are used to treat some cancers, tumours and skin problems.

With X-ray machines, radiologists use gamma rays to check for broken bones or a swallowed 10p coin, as well as for signs of diseases like tuberculosis.

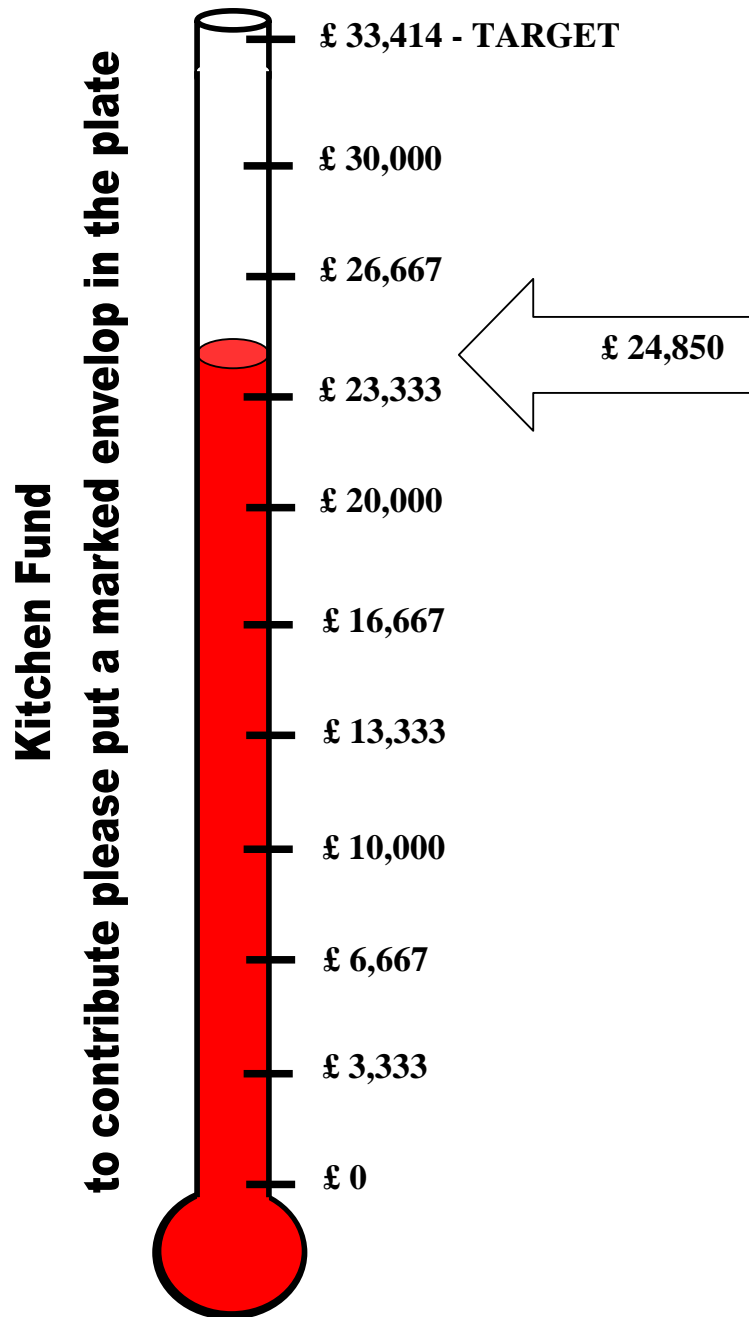
Sources of strong gamma

rays, such as radium and radiocobalt, may be used to X-ray iron castings for flaws and thick metal can be inspected for cracks. There have also been experiments to vulcanise rubber using gamma rays.

In the atmosphere gamma rays lose energy by colliding with atoms in passing through water, air, or other matter. In these collisions, gamma rays may knock electrons loose from their parent atoms. This process is called ionization because it changes the previously neutral atom into a charged particle called an ion.

High-energy gamma rays may produce matter by completely disappearing and forming a pair of particles, one positively charged and one negatively charged. Energy to matter, an important step in the process of creation?
